• **1960 JERSEY TODAY** -- The U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team faces Canada in its third and final preliminary-round game of the XXI Olympic Winter Games. Team USA will wear the 1960 Olympic jersey today in tribute to the team that captured the first-ever gold medal in ice hockey for the United States.

• ALL-TIME vs. CANADA IN THE OLYMPICS -- The U.S. Olympic Men's lce Hockey Team is 2-10-3 all-time against Canada in the Olympic Winter Games. The U.S. last played Canada in the gold-medal game of the 2002 Olympic Winter Games and last defeated the Canadians en route to Team USA's first-ever Olympic ice hockey gold medal at the 1960 Olympic Winter Games.

• DINNER LAST NIGHT -- Team USA dined at Dario's last night and was entertained by Josh Sacco, the five-year-old from just outside Nashville that has become famous for his imitation of Herb Brooks' speech to the 1980 Miracle on Ice Team prior to its game vs. Soviet Union. Sacco performed the speech for the team to thunderous applause after. On Team USA's way out the door, the dining patrons applauded the players while singing O Canada. (If you haven't seen the Sacco speech, go to YouTube.com and search for Josh Sacco)/

• **MILLER** -- **Ryan Miller** will get the call in goal today. He has played the first two games of the Olympic tournament for Team USA and not allowed an even strength goal. Miller has allowed two goals -- one on the power play and the other shorthanded.

 TIDBITS -- The U.S. is playing Canada at the Olympic Winter Games for the 16th time, matching its total for the most games against one opponent (Czechoslovakia) ... With a regulation victory today, the U.S. will clinch Group A and advance to the quarterfinals ... If Team USA receives a bye into the quarterfinals, its scheduled ice time is 8:45 a.m. tomorrow morning at Brittania. If it does not, Team USA's scheduled ice time is for 11:15 a.m., also at Brittania ... With an assist in Team USA's game against Norway on Thursday (Feb. 18) Ryan Miller became the first U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team goaltender to be credited with an assist at an Olympic ... Team USA is 2-0 in the Olympics for the first time since 1992. That year, the U.S. opened with a 6-3 win over Italy and then beat Germany 2-0. It also won its third game vs. Finland by a 4-1 count ... Zach Parise notched his 40th point (21-19) with Team USA with an assist on Patrick Kane's goal Thursday vs. Norway, while Ryan Suter suited up in his 60th game for Team USA ... Ryan Kesler (.823/28-34) is tops among all players in the Olympics in faceoff percentage. Joe Pavelski (.679/19-28) is seventh ... Ryan Malone, David Backes and Ryan Suter are the three U.S. players that have points in both games of the Olympic Tournament ... Brian Rafalski scored two goals in 2:23 span in the third period of Thursday's (Feb. 18) 6-1 win over Norway ... The U.S. has not allowed more than seven shots on goal in any period of the Olympic tournament so far.

• **30-YEAR ANNIVERSARY** -- Tomorrow (Feb. 22) marks the 30th anniversary of the U.S. Olympic Team's stunning upset of the Soviet Union in the 1980 Olympic Winter Games in Lake Placid, N.Y.

• NORWAY HIGHLIGHTS -- Twelve different players recorded a point for the U.S. in its game against Norway on Thursday (Feb. 18). Phil Kessel (1-1--2), Ryan Malone (1-1--2), Zach Parise (0-2--2), Joe Pavelski (0-2--2) and Brian Rafalski (2-0--2) paced the U.S. with two points each. Three players --Chris Drury, Patrick Kane and Kessel -- each score their first Olympic goal in the game.

• **LIGHTNING STRIKES** -- **Ryan Malone**, of the NHL's Tampa Bay Lightning, leads all U.S. players with three points (2-1). The Pittsburgh, Pa., native tallied a goal in Team USA's opening game and added a goal and an assist in the United States' 6-1 victory against Norway.

• **KESSEL AND THE NUMBERS** -- **Phil Kessel** is played in his 50th game in a Team USA uniform today and is just one point away from reaching 65 in a Team USA uniform. Kessel, a native of Madison, Wis., has amassed 64 points (31-33) with Team USA and has played on three U.S. Men's National Teams (2006-08), and two U.S. National Junior Teams (2005-06) and U.S. Men's National Under-18 Teams (2004-05).

• **BIRTHDAY BOY** -- **Ryan Whitney** celebrated his 27th birthday on Friday (Feb. 19). The average of age of Team USA is 26.5 years old.

• **BUSH HONORED** -- **Walter Bush**, chairman of the board of USA Hockey and member of the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame, Hockey Hall of Fame and IIHF Hall of Fame, was awarded the Women and Sport Achievement Diploma on Thursday (Feb. 18) by the International Olympic Committee. The long-time USA Hockey president was one of the key figures in making women's hockey an Olympic sport. Bush was also honored with the Olympic Order in 2002.

• A LITTLE OF THIS AND THAT -- U.S. defenseman Jack Johnson learned how to lift a puck off the ice from fellow Olympic teammate Brian Rafalski. Growing up, Rafalski was an instructor at Jack Johnson Sr.'s hockey school and stayed at the Johnson home ... Ryan Miller and Ryan Callahan taped a piece for MTV News at the USA House Wednesday (Feb. 18) after practice. They were joined by Hilary Knight and Kelli Stack, members of the U.S. Olympic Women's Ice Hockey Team ... Team USA features seven Ryans on its roster, including six players with the first name of Ryan (Malone, Miller, Callahan, Whitney, Suter, Kesler) and one with Ryan as his last name (Bobby).

• **HOBEY CALLING** -- Two members of Team USA have been honored with the Hobey Baker Memorial Award, given to the top player in college hockey. **Chris Drury** took home the honor in 1998 and **Ryan Miller** garnered the award in 2001. Drury was the runner-up for the award in 1997 and a finalist in 1996, and Miller was a finalist in 2002.

• CAPTAINS AMERICA -- Jamie Langenbrunner is the captain of the 2010 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team. Langenbrunner, who played on the 1998 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team, is one of three members of Team USA with prior Olympic experience. Team USA alternate captains include forwards **Dustin Brown** (Ithaca, N.Y./Los Angeles Kings) and **Zach Parise** (Prior Lake, Minn./New Jersey Devils/Univ. of North Dakota), and defensemen **Brian Rafalski** (Dearborn, Mich./Detroit Red Wings/Univ. of Wisconsin) and **Ryan Suter**. • SIBLING RIVALRY -- Phil Kessel may be the household name, but his sister, Amanda, has more golden hardware. She was a member of the gold medal-winning 2008 and 2009 U.S. Women's National Under-18 Teams at the IIHF World Women's U18 Championship.

• OLYMPIC VETERANS -- Jamie Langenbrunner, Chris Drury and Brian Rafalski are the only members of Team USA with prior Olympic experience. Both Drury and Rafalski played for the 2002 and 2006 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Teams, capturing the silver medal at the 2002 Olympic Winter Games in Salt Lake City, Utah. Langenbrunner played for the 1998 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team.

• **OPENING CEREMONIES** -- **Jack Johnson** chartered a private plane from Los Angeles to Bellingham, Wash., and then had a car service drive him to Vancouver so he could march with his U.S. teammates in the opening ceremonies of the Olympic Winter Games on Friday (Feb. 12). Johnson was the only member of the U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team to march. He is the first-ever NHL player to take part in the opening ceremonies. Johnson also had his parents and brother on the flight so they could attend the event. Afterward, Johnson said, "It was by far the coolest experience of my life and worth every second it took to get here."

• MORE TIDBITS -- Zach Parise led all U.S. players with six shots on goal against Norway, while defenseman **Ryan Suter** logged the most ice time (21:33) ... Jonathan Quick dressed as the backup goalie against Norway ... After two games, Parise leads the U.S. with nine shots on goals and **Brian Rafalski** has logged the most ice time (38:46).

• **ROSTER NUGGETS** -- The 23 members of the U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team represent 17 NHL teams and nine states. The Los Angeles Kings have the most players with three, including **Dustin Brown**, **Jack Johnson** and goaltender **Jonathan Quick**. Vancouver Canuck forward **Ryan Kesler** will be playing at Canada Hockey Place as a visitor for the first time in his career. Michigan is the home state for the most U.S. Olympians (six). The U.S. roster includes 12 first-round draft choices, including No. 1 overall selections **Erik Johnson** (2006) and **Patrick Kane** (2007). Seventeen members of Team USA played U.S. college hockey, with the University of Wisconsin leading the way with three.

• **GOLD MEDALISTS** -- Seven members of Team USA have won a gold medal at an IIHF-sanctioned event.

• TEAM USA EXPERIENCE -- Members of the U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team have played in a combined 580 games in a U.S. uniform. Ryan Suter (60), Phil Kessel (49), Dustin Brown (48), Chris Drury (48) and Jack Johnson (44) lead the pack for the U.S. In addition to Brown, Johnson and Suter, David Backes and Joe Pavelski played for 2009 U.S. Men's National Team at the IIHF World Men's Championship.

· FAMILY AFFAIR -- Ryan Suter and Erik Johnson are both playing in their first Olympic Winter Games, but they are not the first members of their families to play for Team USA at the Olympics. Suter's dad, Bob, was a member of the 1980 gold medal-winning 1980 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team and his uncle, Gary, captured a silver medal with the 2002 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team. In addition, Johnson's great uncle, Ken Yackel, won a silver medal with the 1952 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team. father, Peter, Stastny's Paul played for Czechoslovakia at the 1980 Olympic Winter Games and Slovakia at the 1994 Games.

· COACHING STAFF -- The U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team is led by head coach Ron Wilson, head coach of the Toronto Maple Leafs. Wilson previously guided the 1998 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team and coached the gold medal-winning U.S. squad at the 1996 World Cup of Hockey. This is Wilson's seventh head coaching job with Team USA, most recently serving as the head coach of the 2009 U.S. Men's National Team. Scott Gordon, head coach of the New York Islanders, and John Tortorella, head coach of the New York Rangers, are serving as assistant coaches.

· JUNIOR CONNECTION -- Five members of the U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team played in either the United States Hockey League or the North American Hockey League, including Ryan Miller, who suited up for the Soo Indians of the NAHL.

GLEASON, WHITNEY IN -- Tim Gleason (Clawson, Mich./Carolina Hurricanes) and Ryan Whitney (Scituate, Mass./Anaheim Ducks/Boston Univ.) were added to the U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team on Feb. 4. The pair replace injured defensemen Mike Komisarek (West Islip. N.Y./Toronto Maple Leafs/Univ. of Michigan) and Paul Martin (Elk River, Minn./New Jersey Devils/Univ. of Minnesota).

· YOUNG GUNS -- Of the U.S. 23-man roster, 19 members are under 30 years old. Patrick Kane (Buffalo, N.Y./Chicago Blackhawks) is the youngest member of Team USA at 21 years old, while Brian Rafalski is the oldest at 36 years old.
